NEW Release: UAS Comprehensive File

Harmonized HRS variables asked of all adults*, plus cognitive test results, and more! Now Online.

There is now an easier way to explore the health and financial data of the UAS. Researchers interested in the UAS can now download the Comprehensive File!

The UAS Comprehensive File merges the data from a number core surveys in the UAS that are repeated every two years. It includes basic demographics as well as data on cognitive tests, personality, financial literacy, subjective well-being, health, retirement, several surveys dealing with financial management, preparation for retirement and

knowledge of Social Security rules. It includes the harmonized version of the UAS-Health and Retirement Study (UAS-HRS).

Currently, the file contains data of Wave 1 of the following core surveys: UAS1, UAS2, UAS6, UAS16, UAS18, UAS20-UAS25 (the HRS surveys), UAS26 and My Household (the quarterly brief demographic survey). The UAS Comprehensive Data File can also be linked with any of the UAS surveys not already included. These files and their updated documentation, are posted at uasdata.usc.edu. **With support from the Social Security Administration, The National Institute on Aging, and the Society of Actuaries, UAS has undertaken a project to collect measures corresponding to the University of Michigan's Health and Retirement Study (HRS), and to provide a standardized comprehensive public use data set that includes HRS and other relevant UAS variables. We are also creating a web-based visualization tool that will allow users to interactively explore these datasets on a variety of key indicators through customizable animated charts and tables. We will provide more information in subsequent newsletters as this project unfolds.*

Newly Updated UAS Weighting Procedures

Two stages, with adjustment to regional benchmarks

In the Understanding America Study (UAS), sample weights are survey-specific. They are constructed in two steps: base weights adjust for unequal probabilities of sampling, then a final post-stratification adjustment aligns the sample to benchmarks along certain socio-demographic dimensions. The updated procedures now include regional benchmarks in that final adjustment. Please refer to the updated [UAS Weighting Procedures](#) document for details.

Data User Tip: Sample weights are constructed only for the nationally representative core sample (sampletype = 1). UAS members belonging to the special purpose samples of Native Americans and Los Angeles County residents have zero base weight and zero final post-stratification weight.

- Panel response rates of 70-80%
