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SURVEY METHODS

This USC Dornsife/Los Angeles Times Poll is the result of a collaboration between researchers in the *Jesse M. Unruh Institute of Politics* and in the *Center for Economic and Social Research* in the Dana and David Dornsife College of Letters, Arts and Sciences at the University of Southern California, in partnership with the Los Angeles Times.

The poll was conducted online among 1,504 California adults from October 27 through Nov 6, 2017. The survey was conducted in English and Spanish. The poll’s margin of sampling error is plus or minus 3 percentage points for all eligible and plus or minus 4 percentage points among registered voters. Results are among registered voters, unless otherwise indicated. The results were weighted to account for sample design, and to match distributions for race, gender, education, region, income, and household size from the American Community Survey. All tests of significance take into account the effect of weighting.

Respondents are members of the Understanding America Study, a probability-based panel of adults recruited from among all households in the United States, with internet-connected tablets provided to individuals who were not already online. Recruitment of the UAS CA panel is ongoing, so additional sample was purchased from GfK Knowledge Panel and collected through the UAS. The samples were combined and weighted using design weights from both samples. Detailed UAS sampling and recruiting protocols, recruitment-cohort response rates, weighting protocol, panel management protocols, and microdata files* (including nonresponse and paradata) are available online at <https://uasdata.usc.edu>. *Poll microdata files are available for download after a brief embargo; release dates are provided online.
